



Drowned City: Hurricane Katrina and New Orleans


Don Brown

All Rise for the Honorable Perry T. Cook


Leslie Connor

I Will Always Write Back


Martin Ganda & Caitlin Alifirenka





A graphic novel adventure about a girl who discovers roller derby right as she and her best friend are growing apart






Listen, Slowly Thanhha Lai



Powerful biography of Leon Leyson, the only memoir published by a former Schindler's List child.






A Night Divided





I am Princess X Cherie Priest

Two middle-grade kids take a shortcut home from school and discover what looks like fuzzy mud but is actually a substance with the potential to wreak havoc on the entire world.







Orbiting Jupiter Gary D. Schmidt




