Following one family's momentous move from the city to rural Maine, an unexpected bond develops between twelve-year-old Reena and one very ornery cow.









An eighth-grader who dreams of performing in a Broadway musical concocts a plan to run away to New York and audition for the role of Elliot in the musical version of "E.T."









A compelling dual narrative about two remarkable eighth graders: Lily, a transgender girl, and Dunkin, a boy dealing with bipolar disorder.






The Inquisitor's Tale





Upside Down in the Middle of Nowhere Julie Lamana




Ghost, a naturally talented runner and troublemaker, is recruited for an elite middle school track team. He must stay on track, literally and figuratively, to reach his full potential.




